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EVENTS

LGBT History Month



1st February marked the start of LGBT History Month, which celebrates LGBTQ+ people, raises awareness and combats prejudice with education. Throughout February we'll be sharing resources and assemblies to help educate our students, and all members of the MHS community.

We began the month by sharing an LGBT+ song a day with form groups. This sat alongside the history of the musician, and the experiences that those individuals have encountered.

Our highlight so far has been the story of Dusty Springfield (1939-1999), who was an English singer and record producer and bisexual woman. Dusty struggled with her sexuality from a time when being gay may have seen to be the end of a pop stars career. Eventually Dusty came out as bisexual to a newspaper in 1970. Though Dusty still struggled with defining or labelling herself.

We'll also be running a LGBT+ History Month Badge Design Competition. This year's theme is 'The Arc is Long'. The link between art and activism have long gone hand in hand. Art is often used to challenge societal views, powers and discrimination, inequality and inequity. Further information will be shared with students in Form times as well as through the Art Department.

Children's Mental Health Week

Children's Mental Health Week this year is 7th-13th February where the theme is 'Growing Together'. We recognise that in order for us to truly flourish as individuals, we need to ensure our wellbeing is being cared for.

Our Wellbeing Prefects and House Captains created an engaging assembly for all year groups informing them about the importance of looking after our mental, physical and emotional health every day. The assembly highlighted the importance of positive mental health in children, shared information about different types of mental health conditions, brought attention to signs that your mental health is declining and shared helpful coping mechanisms and where to locate further support.

We would like our school community to spend some time reflecting and discussing ways to further support and maintain their wellbeing. As a Trust, we have therefore created a wellbeing booklet that you as families can use to view resources, read information and try new activities. If you have younger children, there are activities for them to also get involved so that the whole family can have fun and get involved together.

United



Each week learners have opportunities to reflect on current issues linked to diversity and inclusion including at a local, national and international level. Teaching global issues as part of PSHE and UNITED allows learners to share their voice across numerous topics. #ITMATTERSTOUS has been developed for all Trust schools as a way to communicate our on-going work; including fundraising with purpose and PSHE campaigns. We want our learners to truly believe that they can make a difference to the ever-changing world around them, that their words matter and to encourage them to be upstanders by channelling their passions in the fight against injustice.

This half term in UNITED we have discussed:


- Homelessness

- Holocaust memorial day.

In 2021 Lionheart Educational Trust launches our Global Issues curriculum series where we began with a focus on Afghanistan and the plight of its people and as part of this raised money for UNICEF by learners participating in a non-uniform day and a bake sale which alone raised over £100. In January we focused on the traumatic realities of refugees. Learners had an informative UNITED session leading to a series of discussions about the current refugee crisis. Some learners chose to write messages of support for refugee children around the world as part of our wider Trust campaign. Some of these messages will be shared in the wider community in the coming weeks.

STEM



Our Year 8, 9 and 10s took part in the Smart Build STEM Challenge delivered at the Martin High School by Matthew at Smallpiece Charity Trust. Throughout the day our learners worked as a team to plan, design and put together the electronics for an irrigation system. They used many skills and learnt many more such as soldering resistors and LEDs to a circuit board. The learners were engaged throughout the day and on task. We had numerous compliments about our pupils from Matthew. The 60 learners who participated in the previous STEM challenge were also awarded their Bronze CREST Certificates. We are very proud of our learners. A big thank you to all the staff at The Martin High School for supporting the STEM workshop on the day.










































Feb Half Term Virtual Work Experience

receive support. The feedback thus far from the practitioners highlights just how engaged and well received the sessions have been and that our learners have been truly representing their school in a positive way.

We couldn't be prouder!


Wellbeing

REMINDERS

- Parking on site On site parking is allocated for staff and visitors only. We ask that parents only park on site if they have scheduled meetings, or if they are collecting a student who is unwell/going for an appointment etc. Drop offs following appointments etc are authorised too. There are allocated disabled bays near main reception for those with the relevant disabled badges should you have need of them.
- **Visitors** If you need to visit the school but don't have a scheduled meeting we ask that you please contact the school via phone or email to arrange this. It is very important that from a safeguarding perspective we know who to expect on site each day. By doing this we can also ensure that your visit runs smoothly and efficiently.
- **Bringing items into school** If you need to bring items into the school that are to be passed to your child we ask that you limit these to essential items only. Please also make sure any items are clearly labelled with the child's name and form group.
- Sanctions -

C1: Three C1's = 1 hour detention


C2: 1 hour detention

C3: 2 hour detention or internal exclusion depending on reason for sanction

*If the student fails to attend their detention without good reason, it will carry over to the next day and the time will be doubled. Two missed detentions in a row will result in a day in internal exclusion.

• Office opening hours - The front office is open from 8.30am -4pm Monday to Thursday, and 8.30am-3.30pm on Friday's. Parents with scheduled meetings after the office closing time will be met by the member of staff who has arranged it. If your child has had an item confiscated during the school day it can only be collected during office opening hours. Any items not collected on the same day will be locked away safely overnight.
