
- Meet the staff

- Practise getting home after the school day


The transition pack will also give you the opportunity to start your 'Superstar's journey' and to use the tools that you have developed at your primary school.


Introduction to SLANT



Resilience and poetry

At Martin High School we learn poetry because it helps us meet the 4C's:

Confidence: Recitation is the perfect introduction to public speaking skills. All students need to be able to speak effectively in front of others both within and beyond MHS.

Continuing learning: Students learn a poem that will likely stay with them for years, if not forever. This term the poem we are learning is a GCSE text which is an added benefit!

Challenging memory and recall: reciting poetry is an especially powerful way to understand language and build confidence.

Community: Every member of staff and every learner is expected to learn the poem. This act of everyone being in it together creates a deeper sense of community at our school.

During your first half term with us, we will be learning "Share Ozymandias" by Percy Bysshe Shelley.


